Lead researcher, Hazem Rashed-Ali of UTSA's College of Architecture, will present on the background of the study, our neighborhood's results, and how we can use the info gleaned to become a more sustainable community.

The study aimed to identify and measure different neighborhood-level sustainability performance indicators for neighborhoods across the city. This tool aims to provide support for neighborhood planning efforts to reduce energy and water consumption, vehicle miles of travel, pollution emissions (including greenhouse gas emissions), and the overall carbon footprint of the city.

Lisa Ortega, CHW, of Methodist Healthcare Ministries, will also provide information on the Wesley Nurse program and the free services offered including blood pressure screenings, blood glucose screenings, health education, group exercise classes and promoting holistic health.

Farewell, Sylvia

Sylvia Gallo Ramirez, wife of MPNA Board Member Frank Ramirez, fought gallantly against cancer for 19 months with her beloved husband by her side. Leticia (Letty) Miller, daughter, and Frank (Tico) Ramirez, son, were also at the bedside daily as well as many relatives including Norma Lozano (Placido), her older sister. Friends and relatives from near and far including a brother, David Gallo, from California and another brother, Herbert Gallo, from San Antonio came to visit. The Bunco ladies came in pairs. Grandchildren took turns helping out. And still on April 8, 2013 at the age of 71, she slipped away.

Visiting with her husband, Frank the other day, the living room still holds her presence. Frank said, "I am keeping the house clean according to her standards." Fresh flowers were everywhere—not the funeral kind—but happy bouquets that expressed her personality. The room itself is a memorial to her. All the pictures gathered for the service and reception are in this room with a large informal portrait of Sylvia sitting outside in a lawn chair. Two candles are lit on either side of the portrait as it rests on the mantle.

There is still the memory of Sylvia saying, "Have you polished the brass lately? Or, Betty comes today. Do you have all the supplies she needs for cleaning?" Even from her hospital bed she made sure the house was spic and span.

Frank didn't seem to need questions. He just wanted to talk. He told of her days at Brackenridge High School where she was president of the Honor Society. She graduated in 1959 and from his wallet he pulled a picture of a young Sylvia, dated 2-24-58. She wrote on the back of the photo, "To Frank with whom I have enjoyed every moment that we have spent together. I hope that our days together in the future will be as bright as those in the past. May they also be days of happiness and not sorrow. With this thought in mind, I shall remain yours forever. Sylvia"

They were engaged in 1959 and married one year later. Frank said, "Her father was a firm, Italian person." "My buddies said you can't get a date with her. Her father is real strict. Nobody has been able to get a date." So Frank bet his buddies that he could get a date. He said, "I was wearing my hair like Elvis then. It was slicked back and long." I had to get a hair cut and then I asked her dad if I could date her. He gave me his permission." Ramirez said, "I won that bet of \$.50." They were engaged for one year before marrying in 1960. From 1959 to 2013 the love flourished with the birth of two children. In 1973 the family moved to the house on Donaldson. Sylvia ran the business office of the family construction business from 1973-2011. She retired from business management because of feelings of fatigue, lost weight and some fever. "She always had check-ups regularly—every three months," Frank said.

How does Frank want her remembered? "She was thoughtful of others. During her illness she would call others who had cancer or were sick and ask how they were doing. And she loved her animals. She was a happy person—she enjoyed going to Bunco and was a member of two clubs." Frank explained, "Of course the neighborhood one in Monticello Park but also an older Bunco club that her sister, Norma, belonged to. "

But many neighbors remember her sense of humor, her matter-of fact way of dealing with cancer, and the way she crinkled her nose. That nose twitched when she did not like or agree with something that was said or done. And who could forget her gorgeous hair with

its' many curls. Cancer did not take that or her spirit that always looked on the sunny side.

Frank's final words, "Life is too precious. Don't put off things. Go and do it."



Remember that the project you choose to beautify your house and consequently the neighborhood can be something very simple or something very complicated. It is up to you.

This application is due by Sunday, June 30, 2013. It and the supporting documents can be turned in to any board member. You do not have to turn in the original receipts, work orders, contracts, etc. You may turn in photocopies, but the dates and relevant information must be visible.

APPLICATION GUIDELIENS ON NEXT PAGE

You must abide by the following rules to be considered for the reimbursement award. A committee will make the final decision as to which household will receive the reimbursement award.

- 1. Your full application must be submitted to a board member by Sunday, June 30, 2013.
- 2. Applications must include receipts, work orders, contracts or photocopies of the same. The Monticello Park Neighborhood Association will reimburse you up to \$500 for your project. If your cost is less than \$500, you will be reimbursed up to the amount of your cost.
- 3. Some store receipts do not give details as to what was purchased. Please list your purchases on a sheet of paper. You must still turn in your receipts, or copies, along with this list.
- 4. The project must be able to be seen by anyone who stands on the street. Your undertaking should take place in the front of the house if you live in the middle of the block. If you live on a corner, the project can be on either the front or the side of the house or yard.
- 5. You must submit a "before" and an "after" picture of your project.
- 6. All repairs/maintenance and changes, including window repairs and landscaping, must be submitted to the Office of Historic Preservation for approval. Check with the Office of Historic Preservation before you begin any work and make sure to obtain a Certificate of Appropriateness. You must submit a copy of the certificate of appropriateness as part of the application. The Office of Historic Preservation is located at 1901 South Alamo. The phone number is 215-9274.
- 7. There are certain types of work that may need a permit from the city. Check with the Office of Planning and Development before you begin any work and obtain a permit if one is needed. If a permit is needed from the city, you must submit a copy of the permit as part of the application. The Office of Planning and Development is located at 1901 South Alamo. The phone number is 207-1111.
- 8. If you were not awarded a reimbursement for your project the first time, and this is the second time you are submitting this application, please make sure that you checked the appropriate space on the application page.

Sexy Second Sunday Brunch @ Deco Pizzeria By Sarah Rice

I'm guessing most of you have been to Deco Pizzeria. BUT, have you been to Sexy Second Sunday Brunch at Deco?

For better or worse, each time my thoughts tinkered with this article I'd hear Justin Timberlake in my head singing "I'm bringing sexy back" with the ensuing repetition of "Get your sexy on." That's the power of music, right? Subconsciously, it makes its imprint.

And music is exactly one of the mediums used to create the sexy vibe that permeates this brunch that takes place at Deco Pizzeria the $2^{\rm nd}$ Sunday of each month. The patio opens at 10:30 am and brunch menu items are served until 2:30 – although DJ Lando is happy to stay and play as long as there's a crowd.

DJ Lando happens to be one of our own Monticello Park residents. In fact, you may recognize him and his wife, Kelly, as one of the hosts of the 2012 Monticello Park Tour of Homes. He and Deco Pizzeria owner, Jacob Valenzuela, hatched the idea of Sexy Second Sunday Brunch.

Says Lando, "I have wanted to do a Dance Club type brunch since I was introduced to the concept in 2000 at a place called La Strada (in Houston). They had a Sunday Brunch that would last all day; with DJs' drink specials and a positive fun loving crowd that would drink, flirt and dance all day. It's actually silly to call it a Brunch because it would last until the early evening. Fast Forward to 2011



when Deco first opened, I saw the potential to recreate such an event. I was in the process of doing major renovation to my house and would often go to Deco to get "To Go" pizza. I met Jacob a couple of times... We talked about places we have been and the idea of a fun funky brunch came up. That was all it took! Jacob was excited because he had been to La Strada's Sunday Brunch. We talked for a few minutes and decided that it was something that needed to happen. We made plans to talk about it more in the Spring, and here we are...Sexy Second Sunday Brunch."

When I asked him how else he would describe the musical vibe he creates for brunch besides "sexy" he replied, "I think Sexy would be the one word to describe the vibe, but if you want a

couple more I like Cool. Smooth, Summer, Breezy, Fun, Sultry (kind of like his picture to the right). I want to create a Sunset Club or Beach Party Vibe. I'm trying to use music to create a Soundscape for people have fun, relax and feel a little groove. I want to see a crowd



drinking, smiling, flirting and some heads moving to the beat. And, yes, I would love to see people dance."

To do this he plays House, Disco House, Deep House and Balearic beat music. He might sprinkle some current dance hits, but only if they fit his set. He also plays a little downtempo and chill-out for the folks who come earlier to the brunch... a before noon set.

Yup, that's right. You are nearing the end of the page and I haven't even started to talk about the food even though this is an article on a brunch. Why? I want you to experience the passion and creativity that go into this monthly experience – to bring to life for you the uniqueness of this brunch among the ocean of eating options here.

Natalie Adcock, who resides near Monticello Park and is owner of Book the Cook, is the chef charged with the restaurant's menu for Sexy Second Sunday Brunch. She grew up taking classes at the ballet academy that was once across street from Deco Pizzeria. The story of how she became involved with the monthly brunch is similar to DJ Lando's. She was eating dinner at Deco one evening and met Jacob. They started talking and hit it off.

Adcock's appreciation for food began at an early age. She was the only daughter in the family and tended to be the one in the kitchen helping her mom. When she went off to college she didn't want to resort to eating Ramen noodles, small budget or not. She worked restaurants in College Station and later in San Antonio where she graduated from UTSA. Her skills were self-taught and her love for entertaining was evident. People started asking if they could hire her to do weddings and baby showers. In 2010 she opened her own business, Book the Cook, known for creating upscale, intimate in-home dinners of 4-5 courses with wine parings.

What that translates into for Sexy Second Sunday brunch is a menu that changes monthly and is created based upon high quality, seasonal ingredients sourced locally. Adcock aims for a fun, whimsical and eclectic combination. Past menu items have included everything from Fresh Spinach Salad with a Warm Bacon Vinaigrette & Poached Free Range Egg to Two Eggs any style, Choice of House Made Maple Sausage or Bacon, Garlic & fresh Herb Fried Potatoes & Home Made Oatmeal English Muffin. One of the items Adcock plans to keep on the menu is the popular Paper Bag Beignets. For last month's Mother's Day brunch, patrons had the option to choose between powdered sugar or cinnamon sugar, accompanied by a raspberry preserve and vanilla bean mascarpone glaze. The flavors you see next month will depend on what's in season and available locally. Of course, you can complement your meal with bellinis and mimosas, unlimited if you so choose.
