VIA did, however, share their plans to improve the standard bus stop at the HEB. It will be a brand new shelter with a significant increase in seating. 

What's the Word, Bird?

The Finch Who Stole...Your Breath Away! Three colorful finches frequently visit our backyards and open spaces – particularly around feeders or sprawling stands of sunflowers. As with many birds, the males flash the bright colors, while the females exhibit less dramatic markings. The House Finch and Lesser Goldfinch are common yearround, with males of the former sporting a reddish forehead, throat and chest and the latter with a bright yellow chest, black cap, and black/dark green back with white patches. The American Goldfinch, more common as a winter visitor, has similar coloration as the Lesser Goldfinch, but with more overall bright yellow feathering.

Ready for the Fall[out]? Be on the lookout for waves of migratory birds such as warblers, tanagers, and orioles that will be passing through our area over the next few months. "Fallouts" occur when




weather events such as colliding fronts, heavy fog, high winds, or heavy rains force migrating birds to seek shelter on the ground – somewhat of a misnomer, these are traditionally associated with spring migrations…but don't be surprised if you wake one morning this fall to see some brightly feathered visitors outside the kitchen window! Texas is within the Central U.S. flyway and has recorded more bird species than any other state. About 2/3 of all birds in the U.S. migrate – the fall migration is often prompted by cooler temps and shorter days. These birds head south to winter in the Southern U.S., Mexico, Caribbean, and Central and South America – Panama has the highest diversity of winter bird residents in the world. The need to find more abundant food, less competition for nesting space, milder climates, and longer daylight hours drive the migrations. Swift, strong fliers and hunters like hummingbirds and hawks tend to migrate during the day, while many birds that live in thick vegetation (ex. warblers) often fly by night.



Who's That Knockin'? A light, rapid hammering sound in the trees or on a telephone pole might signal the presence of a **Golden-Fronted Woodpecker**. These handsome birds frequent Monticello Park throughout the year and have a black-and-white barred back, buff colored chest and head, and yellow marking on nape and above bill – the males also don a small red cap. Insects are the preferred food of choice, but they'll also feed on seeds, nuts, and berries and may even seek a sweet drink at your hummingbird feeder.

The romance between a car, a man or woman and the open road intrigues the soul. It is the call to the open road, to places familiar and unknown. Part of the journey though begins with the car.

Wayne Ehrisman began his love affair with cars as a child. "I could tell the make and model of every car. I built models of cars and when I got my license I knew what kind of car I wanted." He bought a 1954 Oldsmobile Super 88 for \$600.00. It was red, he explained. In college, he became interested in sports cars. His first sports car was a Renault 4CV. Then there was the Triumph TR 3. "I married in that car." Then came an Austin Healey 3000. "I had an orange Fiat Spider for a while but then when the girls were born we drove vans and sedans.

And now with children grown, Ehrisman has a new fleet of fabulous cars. His first sports car post-children was a 1978 Porsche 911 Carrera

S. The official color he said, "Guard's Red." "I bought it in 1990 after my oldest daughter, Sarah, went to Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island. I wondered how I could afford the university, so I gave myself a car." His second luxury car, a 1996 Jaguar X-12 sedan, was purchased for his wife, Emily. "It is a burgundy red with a wood interior. It was the last V-12 engine Jaguar made." He added, "Emily loved Jaguars and I loved Porsches." It was purchased in 1998. The latest dreamy auto is a 2008, 911 Turbo Porsche Cabriolet (convertible). He said," I looked on line for it for 2 years. "It is Artic Silver with a Terra Cotta interior. "Purchased in the fall of 2011, after the death of his wife, this car provides a fast ride about town.



Our second sports car aficionado, Ferne Burney, loved sports cars from an early age. "When I learned to drive my brother and I shared a 1951MG-T.D. classic. We bought it for \$500. My dad said if we came up with half the money, he would supply the other half. My grandfather had it painted and upholstered. "Years later Burney's mother saw the same car. Linda Atwood, on West Kings Highway, definitely got the best deal on the purchase of her first car. "When I was 16 and learning to drive, a family friend, Rocky, sold me the car for \$1.00." This 1960 Karmann Ghia has definitely been around a block or two. It has been passed from sister to sister and put out to pasture at The Atwood's parents' farm in Cosby, Missouri where it rested in a barn along with the dairy cows. Having

gathered its share of cobwebs and cow manure, Atwood's husband, Michael, resurrected it and



brought it back to Texas in 1998. After cutting off the rusty rear of the car, the engine with gleaming exhaust pipes, took its place. Atwood had the car painted a deep orange with smoky fogging at the bottom. Huge wheels with shiny rims adorn this hot rod. Linda purchased these for her husband for Christmas one year. "It needed some jewelry." And those wheels do make a statement. Fenders were replaced, new upholstery with racing harness installed; this car seems ready for a beach. Has it been there? Michael said, "No we mainly take it to Volkswagen shows. This Baja Racer has trophies to show for all the hard work and money the Atwoods have poured into this auto.

David Guerrrero is much more than a car collector. He is a former teacher and principal, an artist and a sculptor. He has restored a 1981 Silverado Chevy pickup that makes one want to laugh when they see it. It is an electric blue with hints of purple and tangelo pearl in combination. It's right out of the crayola box of colors and just makes you happy to look at it. Guerrero said this is his 8th car to restore. He does most of the work himself. In his workshop he has pictures of other cars he has restored. They include a 1952 Chevy Sedan, 1954 and 1955 Ford pickups a 1957 Belaire Chevy, a 1963 Mercedes Sedan and a 1962 Karmann Ghia. In his shop trophies abound for his restorations.

Traveling on Fredericksburg Road

Since the 1840s, Fredericksburg Road has been a trail to the Texas Frontier. To museum visitors and San Antonians, this exhibit is an opportunity to look back on places they remember, miss, and treasure.

From an architectural perspective, Fredericksburg Road is a living timeline of the city's development. For the UTSA College of Architecture, it's a case study for graduate students to observe changes in land use, building typology, residential densities and lot sizes, historic events and notable places.

The exhibit includes maps, photographs, analytical diagrams, economic data, morphological data and population data. Videos featuring oral histories from residents and business owners, and a drive along Fredericksburg Road will offer additional perspective on the road's history and change over time.
