Welk loved color and he wasn't afraid to use it. Men and women in sherbet-toned outfits whirl across the stage. The orchestra plays in apricot-hued velour jackets. Chandeliers dazzle above and swags of rich colors serve as backdrops for this festive evening. Welk snappily waves his baton at the orchestra and during dance numbers, he puts the baton down and dances with the professionals. His feet kick high behind him in polka fashion.

The evening has a sprit of romance and love. The orchestra plays "Moon River" and follows it with "I Never Promised You a Rose Garden". Welk stops to tell his own story of starting with a two-piece band working to full orchestra on stage. Tenors with carefully tended hair croon and women with bouncy curls sing. Everything is sappy-romantic. Banjos play with a hint of New Orleans jazz, and a man wearing a skinny orange suit tap dances and then the stage opens for a soloist singing "Without a Song" from a Broadway musical. There is always an accordion solo and usually a piano duet. The camera



flashes through the audience, showing people smiling, clapping, and dancing. Most are silver haired, but a few stand out as much younger.

Welk closes with "We Won't Be Happy Until We Make You Happy Too". And as he says goodnight, the bubbly music is playing and he says, "Keep a Song In Your Heart".

Contentment flows and the rooms seems filled with peach. Our world has not been peaceful this year, and one wonders where it all going, how we make the best of it, and move forward through each day with hope and joy. 

The History Center

John T. Wilson, Jr., Builds First House in North Woodlawn Terrace



John T. Wilson Jr., home builder, has completed the first home in North Woodlawn Terrace, new section of Woodlawn Terrace. The six-room frame house is typical English in design. The entire building is of cypress and the siding is made of twelve-inch boards. The house is painted in old Virginia white.

The Neighborhood we now call Monticello Park is comprised of several subdivisions built during the 1920s, 1930s, and 1940s. The first subdivision was called North Woodlawn Terrace (Woodlawn Terrace is part of the Jefferson Neighborhood Association boundaries.) The first home built in North Woodlawn Terrace was on Furr Drive and this beautifully maintained house is still standing proud today, at 232 Furr. Here is the newspaper announcement for that home from The San Antonio Light, July 19, 1925.
